### Minors

**The Classics minor requirements are as follows:**

Language: 2 continuous semesters of either Latin or ancient Greek.

Civilization: 3 core Classics courses, see course listing above.

**Minor in Modern Greek- 16 credits**

Language: GRK 2220 Modern Greek III, GRK 2221 Modern Greek IV

### Classical Languages with Honors

To graduate with Honors in Classical Languages, the successful candidate must complete all requirements for the Classical Languages track, pass a sight translation exam in either Greek or Latin and also produce a mentored thesis, defended before a committee of three members drawn from Classical Studies. Student must maintain a departmental and overall GPA of 3.50.
